MUCOBADI was first registered as a Community Based Organisation (CBO) in 2003 and later in 2008 assumed Non-Government organisation (NGO) status after registering with the National NGO Board as a Non-Government Organisation (No: S.5914/7569).



Pavan is one of the children who were reached during nutrition assessment exercise in late 2017 and found to be severely malnourished. PAVAN's grandfather, Nongo Alfred testified that MUCOBADI's intervention greatly helped him to know his grandson's critical state (SAM).



Continuums of services were layered during the dialogues like HTS, TB screening, Malaria diagnosis and treatment among others and;

Other key achievements for 2017


40 Coordination mechanism meetings were held to improve on the quality of service delivery. The meetings attracted 353 duty bearers who included the police, Health Centre in-charges, teachers, political leaders, religious leaders among others. These led to improved service delivery for example improvement on teacher pupil teacher ratio and increased staffing for under staffed schools like Maziriga Primary and Kimasa Primary schools in Bugiri was largely due to advocacy during these coordination meetings. The coordination platforms included the DOVCCs, SOVCCs and Network and coordination meetings with partners and other stakeholders.


72 awareness dialogues were conducted to sensitize communities on rights and responsibilities. The topics of discussion were around children's rights and responsibilities of parents and the wider community in fulfilling these rights, GBV, the importance of education, Succession planning and will making among others. These attracted 3107 community members.





3760 case of child abuse have were identified and 1983 were resolved by Para social workers and other stake holders like CDOs, Police, and health workers in the year 2017.





1740 children and Youths both in and out of school have been reached with protection and economic empowerment information. This has changed their attitudes, perceptions and empowered them to know their rights and demand for their entitlements from duty bearers.

My linkage to none formal education enabled me create my own job

I am called Ateng j aged 21 years old, I come from Asinge B Zone village, Osukuru Sub-County, Tororo District. I dropped out of school because of lack of schools fees since my father who was paying my lost his job. MUCOBADI supported para social in my village mobilized me to join a girl's first club where I was trained in life skills, financial literacy among others. I was later linked to a local artisan who trained me in hair dressing. I make UGX 10,000 per day.

Other key achievements for 2017

46 distributed to Farmers by certified distributer Green Village Ltd

Vulnerable Households were supported with improved Maize inputs to a tune of 552 kgs from certified input dealers like grow more seeds

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204 Vulnerable households were supported with improved quality beans inputs. 2460 kgs of Beans were distributed to farmers to enhance improved food security and nutrition in the communities we serve.

83 06 Youths were supported and enrolled into Non-Formal Education skills trainings to empower them with employable skills for improved livelihoods.


